In accordance with rule 19.10.3.304 NMAC, *Minimal Impact New Mining Operations*, I reviewed our records to determine if cemeteries, burial grounds or cultural resources listed on the State Register of Cultural Properties or the National Register of Historic Places exist within or near the permit area.

Our records show that there are no cultural resources listed on the National Register or State Register within or near the proposed permit area and no known cemeteries or burial grounds. Known archaeological sites are also absent from the permit area. Based on this information, the permit for the Cuba Humate Processing Facility appears to meet minimal impact status.
