The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Las Cruces District Office (LCDO) invites you to participate in a public process to gather input regarding the preparation of an Environmental Assessment (EA) for a proposed magnesium/dolomite quarry mine application submitted by American Magnesium, LLC (AmMg). The BLM LCDO received a Plan of Operations (PoO) for the proposed mine located near Deming, in Luna County, New Mexico. This letter invites you to attend a public scoping meeting and initiates a 30-day external public scoping period for the Foothill Dolomite Mine Project and proposed PoO. ## **Project Overview**

AmMg submitted a PoO to the BLM LCDO to develop an approximately 40-acre site as a dolomite quarry mine on BLM-managed public lands 12 miles south of Deming in Luna County (see attached map). Dolomite is a form of the mineral magnesium, which has been identified as a critical mineral by Executive Order 13817, Federal Strategy to Ensure Secure and Reliable Supplies of Critical Minerals and is listed on the Department of Interior's Final List of Critical Minerals.

The Proposed Action consists of improvements to an existing BLM road, construction of a new mine site access road, development of construction laydown yard and temporary structures, resource verification drilling, and excavation and removal of dolomite resources. The anticipated total surface disturbance for the project would be approximately 30-acres total. Surface disturbance would occur in phases and would be subject to refinement based on the results of the resource verification drilling that would occur during the initial phase of mine development. Access road improvements include expanding, improving, and maintaining 2 miles of one existing BLM road and constructing and maintaining a 0.25-mile new road from the BLM road to the access the mine site. Public access would be restricted on the new 0.25-mile mine access road and within the proposed mine site.

The mining operations would involve the blasting and removal of the dolomite deposit over three phases, working from the highest elevation of each phase, until reaching the valley floor. Extracted ore would be transported to a manufacturing facility off-site using the access roads described above. No permanent structures would be needed to support the mining operation; only mobile facilities would be used for offices, portable toilets, and sanitation facilities. It is estimated that the mine would be operational for 20 years. Upon completion of mining, the mine would be a shallow bowl that would be open to the natural slope on the southwest side of the foothill. Reclamation of surface disturbance at closure would include removing culverts, recontouring and reseeding of the mine access road, seeding and mulching the floor of the mine, and stabilizing mine walls. Applicant-committed measures and the reclamation plan, included in AmMg's PoO, are part of the proposed project design.

The applicant-committed measures incorporate applicable best management practices and environmental protection measures, which are industry- or agency-recommended construction methods that are routinely or specifically implemented to minimize impacts to resources.
