FOR CONDUCTING A COMPREHENSIVE STUDY AND DEVELOPING A RESTORATION
AND REMEDIATION PLAN FOR THE SAN JUAN MINE**

The State of New Mexico, Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD), Mining and Minerals Division (MMD) seeks an individual or firm (Offeror), to investigate and determine the extent of any environmental contamination of the lands and waters on the San Juan Mine in Farmington, New Mexico (Mine) and prepare a comprehensive study (Study) applying the jurisdictional basis of the New Mexico Surface Mining Act (Act), NMSA 1978, Section 69-25A-1, and other applicable laws. All work must be completed in a timely manner to allow MMD to meet legislative deadlines.

Offerors must provide services of qualified, properly licensed consultants with expertise in all phases listed in the scope of work and have at least 10 years of experience working in environmental impact assessments, environmental risk assessments and at least five years of experience working in environmental remediation. Offeror must demonstrate competency in understanding and applying the Act and all other applicable laws.

Potential Offerors shall submit their proposals electronically in PDF format to Erik Munroe at the above email address no later January 12, 2024 at 3 p.m. MST. Proposals must be submitted in the format specified in the RFP and must be received by the stated date and time to be considered. MMD shall not accept proposals received after this date and shall make absolutely no exceptions for proposals not received by the appointed time.

The Procurement Code, NMSA 1978, Sections 13-1-28 through 13-1-199, imposes civil and criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities, and kickbacks.
