## **Endangered Plant Transplant Permit Application Procedures**

All transplant projects on federal, state, and private lands require a permit from the EMNRD – Forestry Division (unless the transplant project is carried out by a federal employee on federal lands). Transplant permit applications for state listed endangered plants must contain the following information:

- Name of the person performing the transplant (permittee)
- Qualifications of permittee to perform the transplant
- Reason for transplanting need
- Name and location of the proposed project
- Proposed transplant timeframe
- Survey report, including a map
- Number of plants found during surveys, number of plants to be transplanted, number of plants impacted by project footprint.
- Mitigation measures implemented to avoid impacts
- Mitigation measures implemented to minimize impacts
- > Location of transplant site and a description of the long-term protections provided at the site
- Transplant protocol (for Clover's cactus, provided by the BLM)
- Monitoring plan (for Clover's cactus, provided by the BLM)

## All Clover's cactus transplant permits are contingent on approval by the BLM NM State Office.
