

Dockside Safety Checklist



Mandatory For All Persons Operating A Rental Motorboat (Includes Personal Watercraft & Sailboats):

New Mexico Law (66-12-18.1) requires that a person born after January 1, 1989 who operates a motorboat on the waters of this state shall have received, as an authorized operator of a rented or leased motorboat, instructions regarding the safe operation of the motorboat and summary of the statutes and rules governing the operation of a motorboat from a person in the business of renting or leasing motorboats. New Mexico Administrative Code (18.17.4 NMAC) requires that anyone operating a rental motorboat **Review**, **Initial and Sign** the dockside safety checklist in the rental agent's presence before they operate the rental motorboat and must carry their issued copy of this dockside safety checklist onboard while operating.

		Operators Initials	Boat Safe = Boat Sober! It is illegal to operate a vessel, or to permit others to do so, when under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Anyone being towed may not be under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Operating under the influence is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 and up to a year in jail.

Operate Defensively I am aware of how to depart

Operators and approach the dock in a safe Initials and proper manner. I have been shown the lines to use and how to properly secure the boat. Courtesy docks have a 10 minute stay limit.

I understand operating in "No Wake" zones in the marina Operators and launching areas and others marked by "No Wake" Initials buoys. "No Wake" speeds are observed within 150' of docks, mooring lines, beached or anchored vessels within 150' of shore, swimmers present (including water skiers or others on towed devices) or persons fishing. Operating within150' of areas/vessels with "Divers Down" flags is prohibited. No towing of devices or water skiers may be done in any "No Wake" area.

> I will not follow directly behind PWC's or other boats. It is prohibited to go 150' or nearer other boats to jump wakes or to spray or splash boats or persons in the water. Aggressive maneuvers are considered to be operating in a reckless or negligent manner endangering life or property.


Scan Constantly



I must scan constantly for people, Operators objects and other boats (including

Initials PWC's). I understand tunnel vision effects and the need to be alert for conditions that limit operational visibility or can block vision of others. I have demonstrated glancing, a quarter head rotation and looking over ones' shoulder prior to and during a turn.

Operate Responsibly – Avoid Aggressive Maneuvers


Avoid sharp turns and other dangerous maneuvers PWC ONLY that make it difficult for others to understand where you are going. Making such sharp turns or other maneuvers increase the risk of back/spine injury (paralysis), facial injuries and broken legs, ankles or other bones

I will maintain a proper lookout at all times for other boats, navigational hazards and weather. I have been told what the daily weather forecast is for today's rental period and what to do when caught in a storm.



Keep Away From Intake Grate or Propeller

The kill switch, or shut-ONLY off cord/ lanyard must be securely attached to your wrist or life jacket (as told) and worn at all times. Then if you fall off, the engine will stop. Do not apply throttle when anyone is at the rear of the PWC since hair, clothing or PFD straps can become entangled in moving parts resulting in severe injury or drowning. Applying the throttle while anyone is standing or swimming toward



the rear of the PWC can cause water and/or debris to exit the jet thrust nozzle causing serious injury.

I have been shown boarding from the rear and the proper way to turn over the capsized personal watercraft from the rear and understand that failure to do so in the proper direction can result in the sinking of the PWC.

Other Rules and Safety Information

Practice Safe Towing With Watersports

To tow a watersport participant, Operators Initials

the vessel must carry the operator, an observer and person being towed. The observer (a person other than



the driver of the vessel) must continuously observe the person(s) being towed. The observer must display a red / orange flag when the skier is in the water, preparing to ski or has fallen. Waterskiing, tubing, etc. is prohibited from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise. Any person being towed must wear their lifejacket.

Know the Waters
