HAZARDOUS FUELS ON NON-FEDERAL LANDS (NFL) GRANT APPLICATION STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENERGY, MINERALS AND NATURAL RESOURCES DEPARTMENT, FORESTRY DIVISION

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The State of New Mexico, Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD), Forestry Division (Forestry Division) Hazardous Fuel Treatments on Non-Federal Lands (NFL) Grant Program exists to reduce the fire threat to New Mexico Communities by thinning forests along non-federal and federal lands. Eligible applicants are non-federal governmental entities, including tribes, that are surrounded by hazardous forest fuels, which pose a threat in the event of a wildland fire. Funding for this program is provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service (USFS) with Wildland Fire Hazardous Fuels (WFHF) funding. The Forestry Division may consider projects not funded with WFHF funding for other federal and state hazardous fuels reduction funding that may become available.

The Forestry Division accepts applications for NFL grants year-round. The maximum individual grant request is \$400,000.00. Applications are reviewed and ranked only once per year after the USFS delivers an annual Offer of Funding to the State Forester.

PROJECT REQUIREMENTS

The following requirements apply to all proposed projects:

- Projects must complement hazardous fuel reduction on USFS lands in high priority areas such as those identified in <u>Community Wildfire</u> <u>Protection Plans</u> (CWPPs) or equivalent collaborative plans.
- 2. If Applicants submit projects that occur on private land that include specific properties (*i.e.* if Applicants name a private property landowner in the Application), those private landowners must have been competitively procured prior to including them in the Application. In this event, Applicants shall include a copy of the competitive procurement document (public notice, Request for Proposals, etc.) along with their completed Application.
- 3. Projects shall reference the adjacent USFS project and identify potential impacts to state or private lands that are to be mitigated using these granted funds.
- 4. Projects must show collaboration and consultation between local USFS officials and community leaders. The adjacent National Forest must be involved in project planning and implementation. All proposed projects need to contribute to strengthen the partnership between the state, USFS, and affected communities.

- 5. Projects require the completion of the appropriate environmental documentation.
- 6. All successful Applicants shall provide the Forestry Division with spatial data depicting the area where hazardous fuel activities were accomplished.
- 7. Matching funds are not required; however, the Forestry Division encourages the use of non-federal funds or in-kind contributions.
- 8. Projects must be completed within two years.
- 9. Project costs may include all costs necessary to plan and implement the projects on non-federal land only. Costs may not include those associated with educational programs, public meetings, and other activities that are not directly related to implementing a project on the ground.
- 10. The Forestry Division will place more emphasis on projects that are adjacent to federal projects identified in a CWPP and that involve collaboration with project partners.
- 11. Funding priority is for private, tribal, and pueblo lands, then state or other non-federal lands, such as county, and municipal-owned lands, as well as lands managed by Soil and Water Conservation Districts.
- 12. All proposed projects must:
 - a. benefit a community-at-risk listed in the current year Communities at Risk (CAR) Plan, available on the CWPP webpage;
 - b. incorporate socio-cultural values and promote the economic wellbeing of the area (*i.e.* use of local thinning contractor, material used by either local business or within the regional area, etc.); and
 - c. include a maintenance plan.

ADDITIONAL NOTICES

- All Applicants must complete and submit a <u>Financial Capability Questionnaire</u> and submit it with their application.
- All Applicants must review the criteria indicated on the <u>Federal Eligibility</u>
 <u>Checklist</u>. Successful Applicants will be required to comply with the Federal Eligibility Checklist.
- Award of agreements is contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorization being made by the Forest Service.
- Where applicable, Applicants must factor in Governmental Gross Receipts Tax (GGRT) as part of their responses. Any response that does not clearly indicate GGRT is included in the cost section may be deemed non-responsive and rejected.
- The Forestry Division may reject any and all applications when it is in the State of New Mexico's best interest.
- The Forestry Division may conduct discussions with Applicants who submit applications but may also accept applications without such discussions.
- The last funded project may receive only partial funding if the Forestry Division lacks sufficient monies to fully-fund that project. Project contacts will be notified

by the Forestry Division Program Manager before any partial funding is approved.

SUBMISSION AND REVIEW

Applications are reviewed and ranked annually after the annual deadline identified on the Forestry Division Forestry and Fuels Grants webpage. To apply, complete Attachment 1 and email it with project area shapefiles and a completed Financial Capability Questionnaire to Jacob Pederson, Forest Restoration Officer, at jacob.pederson@emnrd.nm.gov. Applications will be scored and ranked according to criteria specified in Attachment 2.
